Piwakawaka track is ready to ride!

Sport and Recreation Committee Chair Tim Skinner joined with Gary Donaldson, representing Donaldson Civil and the MTB Trails Trust, to explore the recently completed shared use Piwakawaka track in Marsden Valley. Its name is taken from the Māori name for the fantail birds that are common in the area.

The new track is just over 630 metres long. It is located at the end of Marsden Valley Road and links in with other popular tracks in the area.

Council contracted Donaldson Civil Ltd in partnership with the MTB Trails Trust to build the shared use entry level (Grade 2) track on Council reserve land. The MTB Trails Trust then volunteered to extend the track at their cost onto neighbouring private land with the landowner's agreement.

Sport and Recreation Committee Chair Tim Skinner says, "This combined effort has produced a great new section of track that will meet the needs of walkers as well as kids and new mountain bikers needing a safe place to try out the sport and hone their skills. I want

to thank all those involved for doing such a great job and I encourage families to go along and make the most of it."

The MTB Trails Trust's Chris Mildon says, "The Trust is delighted to have delivered this project with Council and with the support of the private landowner. Making public areas more accessible to a wider range of recreational users with trails like Piwakawaka meshes well with the Trust's vision for the region.

"We also hope that this shared use trail will help bring on the next stages of trail development for the Marsden Reserve, allowing easier access to a beautiful part of Nelson's front country."

Coastal Hazards and Sea Level Rise event comes to Nelson

Nelsonians will have the opportunity to get the latest update on sea level rise science and a new approach to help coastal communities prepare for long term change at the Coastal Hazards and Sea Level Rise event on 8 August.

Climate change is expected to increase the risk of coastal hazards around New Zealand as sea level rises.

Dr Rob Bell (NIWA), Dr Dan Zwartz (Ministry for the Environment) and Sylvia Allan (Allan Planning and Research Ltd) will present on the key information from the Ministry for the Environment's updated Coastal Hazards and Climate Change guidance document.

The event will look at the following topics:

- The relationship between climate change and natural hazards
- Using sea level rise scenarios in adaptive planning

- Engagement expectations between councils and communities
- Community planning under conditions of uncertainty (the dynamic adaptive pathways planning approach)

Following the presentation, there will be time for questions and discussion.

The new service will allow you to submit and track applications, including building consents, certificates of acceptance, exemptions and code compliance certificates. Inspection bookings will be managed using the AlphaOne booking app.

two information evenings where you can find out how the new system works and set up your customer login so you are ready to go on 1 October. These sessions will be useful for anyone who may want to use AlphaOne in the future.

Have you registered your dog?

All dogs over three months old should have been registered by 1 July.

If you don't get it done before 31 July you could be liable for an infringement fine as well as a late registration fee and Council really wants to ensure that doesn't happen. The easiest way to register your dog is via Dogs Online at my.nelson.govt.nz.

If you need any help with setting up an account, logging in or registering your dog, contact Council's Customer Service Centre and we can help. The Dogs Online system only accepts payment by credit card, so if you want to pay by internet banking go to nelson.govt.nz/internet-payment.

Dog registration fees are used for dog control services, including running the animal shelter, dog patrols, education, advice, signage and providing dog poop bags. Find out more:

Check out the new NBus timetable and Stoke Loop

The big changes for NBus start next week, Monday 30 July.

There will be timetable changes on all routes so grab a copy of the new timetable from the depot in Bridge Street, on the bus or from the Council office in Trafalgar Street. You can also see it all online at nbus.co.nz.

Some services will be leaving earlier and some slightly later so please check the new timetable to avoid missing the bus or having a longer wait!

Stoke Loop

Next Monday will also see a revised Stoke Loop back on the road. The new service will cater more specifically for the needs of those who used the service before.

There are five services a day, starting from the Tennis Courts at Main Road Stoke and travelling around the suburb between Saxton Road East, Quarantine Road,

The Ridgeway and Seaview Road. The bus leaves at 9.15, 10.15, 11.15, 1.15 and 2.15 every weekday and takes almost an hour to complete the full loop, but passes through Central Stoke three times during the journey so you won't need to spend the full hour on the bus.

Because of the hours it runs, the Stoke Loop is always FREE to Super Gold Card users. Otherwise there is a flat fare of \$2.50 for adults and \$1.50 for children (children under 5 are free on all NBus services).

The Stoke loop remains a "Hail and Ride" service, so there is no need to wait at a formal bus stop. Just signal the driver and the bus will stop where it is safe to do so. You might be able to catch it right on your doorstep!

These changes will all come into effect from 30 July 2018 and the new timetables will be available soon, so check it out at nbus.co.nz.

Old Lumpy Skate Park gets a makeover

The skate park fondly called 'Old Lumpy' near the Trafalgar Centre was given a much-needed makeover recently.

Last year we held a competition for designs from young people to paint on the skate park and with so many creative designs we chose three to decorate the park. We didn't expect much public interest in the project, but we were proved wrong.

The public showed a great interest in the skate park, some people saying how they walked past there every day, how their kids played there, and even calling for the park to be resurfaced.

In the end the skate park was painted with 'street style' graffiti with the words 'Old Lumpy' in the middle and the surrounds have been adorned with emoji.

The final element will be a rainbow design that will be painted in the bowl once the weather warms up. A sign with information about the project, the Nelson Youth Council and the skate park will be installed.

What was most interesting, and most heartening about the project was the response seen from the public. This project has shown that Nelsonians and the young people of Nelson care about the city they live in and the spaces they use.

It's important that we take notice, and take part in shaping our city to foster a sense of belonging, which is what painting Old Lumpy was all about.

New lease on life for Ngawhatu Playground

The neighbourhood playground was in need of updating so last summer, Council invited the local community to meet at the park and indicate what sort of features they wanted to see there.

Thanks to all the families who gave us their feedback. Judging by the numbers of children turning up to play on a daily basis, the new, improved playground is a hit!

The upgrade included:

- Four traditional playground items.
- Three natural play spaces featuring locally sourced logs and rocks.

- New landscaping, including wheel chair accessible paths to access the swing and slide and more than 1000 new plants and grasses.

- As well as the information board installed, eight octopus facts were installed on small oval plaques hidden on posts throughout the area.

An information panel has been installed detailing the story behind how the Octopus's Garden got its name. Have a hunt for the interesting octopus facts on little oval plaques that have been hidden on posts throughout the area.



Women's Refuge National Appeal Month under way

July is Women's Refuge National Appeal Month, which included a Street Appeal in Richmond and Nelson last week and an opportunity to raise awareness of the organisation.

Nelson Women's and Children's Refuge/ Ngā Wahine Tamariki Punanga o Whakatū's community office is at 1A Wainui Street and provides a number of services.

There is a 24x7 crisis phone line available on 0800 16 33 44. Women's Refuge offers a confidential safe house for women and children fleeing domestic violence.

They also work with many women and children in the community who live in their own homes as well as those in the safe house.

Women's Refuge offers support and advocacy for women and children experiencing domestic violence. The service can help with legal advocacy, including with lawyers,

Work and Income, doctors and hospitals, and linking with other government and non-government agencies.

Women's Refuge can also provide emergency housing for families with children who are homeless and on the Housing New Zealand register.

Nelson Mayor Rachel Reese donated \$1000 to Women's Refuge from the Mayor's fund to acknowledge the birth of Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern and partner Clarke Gayford's daughter, Neve Te Aroha.

This reflects the generosity of spirit of the Prime Minister in making sure that all New Zealanders deserve the best support possible.

Storm repairs update

Much of the damage caused by the extreme weather events in February this year has now been repaired.

Wakefield Quay

Repairs to the Settlers Memorial walkway, the Seafarers Walkway and beach access steps were completed three weeks ahead of schedule and within budget.

Tahunanui Beach

Repairs to the dunes, bollard and rope barriers, boardwalks and the Lions Playground are all complete.

One Back Beach car park has reopened, but one remains closed as Council considers the best long term options for this section of the beach. An extra section of green space will be opened for parking once the weather warms up to cater for summer visitors.

A number of pine trees at the Back Beach have now died due to being inundated with salt water. They will be felled over the coming months.

Rocks Road

The footpath was repaired at the same time as the NZTA road resurfacing. The chain link fence is now complete again after new poles had to be made to order to replace the 20 that were lost in the storm.

Whakatu Drive Path

The missing section has been reinstated and extra rock protection has been added.

Monaco

The jetty has been repaired. A dead tree at Fosters Reserve has been removed and reused as a playground feature in the Octopus's Garden. A replanting programme is being planned. A resource consent application has been lodged to carry out repairs on the Martin Road Peninsula.

The Glen

Short term repairs have been carried out at Airlie Street/Seafield Terrace and Council is now in the process of investigating options for the long-term storm protection work in this vulnerable location.

Akersten Street

Work is underway now to repair the damage to the footpath at the northern end of Akersten Street.

Various slips and track repairs have also been carried out in Council reserves all around the region.

Thanks to everyone for their patience and understanding as we've worked our way through tackling all these repairs.



Parking charges change from 1 August

From 1 August 2018 the hourly charge for parking in Nelson city will increase by 50 cents to \$2. The first hour of parking will remain free in all Council car parks.

The change was adopted as part of the Long Term Plan with the increase to \$2 per hour aimed at raising additional funding to support plans to enhance and improve the CBD

How parking works at the moment will not

change – keep doing what you are doing. The price for the hours following your free hour simply increases by 50 cents.

Here's a reminder of how it all works:

- First hour of parking is free in all areas within the CBD, but you must display a ticket in a pay and display park, whether paying for parking or enjoying free parking.
- Please be aware that the Pay and Display meters will have two options to choose from. One is for the free hour option, but if you want to stay longer, choose the other option. You still get the free hour and then pay for the extra time you choose. Instructions will be given on the

meter screen so please follow those and remember to press OK to collect your ticket.

- Parking fees after the first free hour will now be at the rate of \$2 per hour.
- Free all day car parking is available for all Council carpooling permit holders in four handy locations, Haven Road by ANZAC Park, Harley Street, off Bridge Street, Kerr Street, by Smiths City, Achilles Avenue, by the old Hunting and Fishing building. Check nelson.govt.nz for details and to apply for your permit.
- Current parking time limits will still apply – check signs and meters for times.

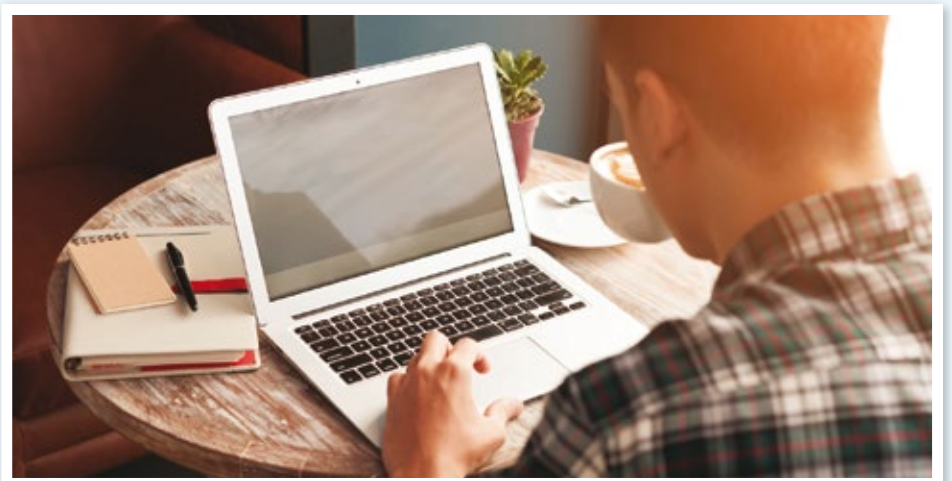

Love food, hate waste? How to feed families for \$60

Produced by Love Food Hate Waste and supported by Nelson City Council, Easy Choice – Family Kai is a seasonal meal planner and recipe book, which consists of four weeks of five dinner meal plans that will feed a family of six for approximately \$60-a-week.

Easy Choice employs many different strategies to help keep the cost of food low, while ensuring that each meal is healthy and balanced – from making sure that no food goes to waste to helping with shopping planning and using

practical ingredients like frozen vegetables, through to using the leftovers from one meal to make another.

Each week's ingredients should cost approximately \$60, although this may vary based on produce prices, the supermarket you shop at and weekly specials.

The winter edition of Easy Choice is the second of four seasonal meal planners to be released, following the launch of the autumn edition in April. The spring booklet will follow in October

with the summer plan being released in January.
